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
What is it and when was it established?

- The International Civil Aviation
 Organization (ICAO) was
 founded on 7 December 1944
 through the Convention on
 International Civil Aviation,
 commonly known as the
 "Chicago's Convention".
- ICAO is a specialized body of the United Nations with the main objective of developing principles and techniques for the regulation of international air navigation.



What are its function and responsibilities?

01	AVIATION SECURITY	ICAO develops standards and recommendations to promote civil aviation security globally.
02	EFFICIENCY AND DEVELOPMENT	It is committed to improving the efficiency and sustainable development of international air transport through the standardization of procedures and the harmonization of regulations.
03	ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION	Contributes to the development of sustainable practices to mitigate the environmental impact of aviation.
04	AIR TRAFFIC REGULATION	Provides guidelines for the regulation of air traffic, including airspace management.
05	INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION	Facilitates cooperation between member states to ensure uniform regulation and safe and efficient management of civil aviation.



This multilateral organization plays a vital role in promoting safety, efficiency and sustainability in international civil aviation.

WHAT IS THE MAIN SUBJECT AND WHICH ARTICLES DOES IT INCLUDE?

• The provided articles mainly cover the **establishment** of the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) and its main **objectives**.

• It includes 5 articles:

- Art 43: Name and composition;
- Art 44: Objectives;
- Art 45: Permanent seat;
- Art 46: First meeting of the Assembly;
- Art 47: Legal capacity.

Chapter VII (Art. 44) of the Chicago's Convention 2/3

Develop the principles and techniques of international air navigation.

02

To foster the planning and development of international air transport to:

- Ensure safe, orderly growth of aviation.
- Promote **peaceful** aircraft design and operation.
- Develop **airways and airports** for international aviation.
- Meet global needs for safe, efficient air travel.
- Prevent economic waste from unfair competition.
- Respect states' rights, ensure fair opportunities.
- Avoid discrimination among contracting states.
- Promote safety in international air navigation
- Foster development of **global** aeronautics.

Chapter VII of the Chicago's Convention 3/3

WHY CHICAGO CONVENTION CHAPTER VII IS IMPORTANT?

- Establishment of International Oversight: It establishes the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO), providing a framework for international collaboration and oversight in civil aviation.
- **Promotion of Safety and Efficiency**: It outlines objectives aimed at ensuring safe, efficient, and orderly growth of international aviation, including the development of air navigation principles and infrastructure.
- **Protection of Rights and Fairness**: It emphasizes the protection of states' rights, fair opportunities for all contracting states in operating international airlines, and the prevention of discrimination, fostering a more equitable global aviation environment.

Chapter III of the Chicago's Convention 1\3

WHAT IS THE MAIN SUBJECT AND WHICH ARTICLES DOES IT INCLUDE?

• The provided articles mainly cover the nationality of aircraft, registration, and reporting requirements in relation to the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) standards;

• Includes 5 articles, from Art. 17 to Art. 21.

Chapter III of the Chicago's Convention 2\3

Art. 17 Nationality of the aircraft

Main Content:

Aircraft shall take the nationality of the State in which they are registered

Art. 21 Reporting Requirements *Main Content:*

Contracting States must provide information on the registration and ownership of aircraft at the request of other Contracting States or ICAO. In addition, they shall send periodic reports to ICAO on relevant information regarding the ownership and control of aircraft.

Chapter III

Artt. 18 e19 Registration of the aircraft

Main Content:

An aircraft may not be registered validly in more than one State, but the registration may be transferred from one State to another, following the laws and regulations of the Contracting State

Art. 20 Nationality Marks and Registration

Main Content:

Aircraft engaged in international air navigation must carry the appropriate nationality and registration marks.

Chapter III of the Chicago's Convention 3\3

WHY CHICAGO CONVENTION CHAPTER III IS IMPORTANT?

- These ICAO articles are crucial as they establish global rules for nationality, registration and reporting of aircraft;
- Clear nationality attribution and accurate registration allow for legal responsibility and traceability, promoting safety and regularity of air operations;
- Standardised marks facilitate identification, contributing to the order of air traffic.
